Description

This course introduces students to the implementation of planning objectives via the statutory development control system, with particular reference to the NSW planning system. Various development control systems are examined, based on common law, statute and policy. Considered in detail are aspects of statutory and policy planning including the nature of environmental planning instruments, the development application process, and statutory-based development assessment. Emphasis is placed on familiarising students with the practical and creative skills required by a professional planner in undertaking various tasks involved in the development assessment process.

Aims

This course aims to expand students' knowledge of the statutory planning system in NSW, and to introduce students to a number of practical skills required in plan making and development assessment.

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Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs)

At the successful completion of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of NSW planning system and legislation that affect development assessment.
- 2. Demonstrate a clear understanding of the operation of key provisions and requirements of the NSW Environmental Planning and Assessment Act.
- 3. Develop advanced knowledge and appreciation required by a professional planner in undertaking various planning tasks.
- 4. Interpret and utilise the provisions of environmental planning instruments and the role of local government in development assessment.
- 5. Analyse the impacts of a development proposal through an assessment report.
